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A LETTER FROM OUR FOUNDATION LEADERSHIP








A fund situated at the Pikes Peak Community Foundation (PPCF) that provides a space for cofunding amongst foundations or donor advised funds. In 2020, we worked alongside six local funders to provide a \$70,000 grant to Resiliency Through Innovation – a newly positioned fund at PPCF that works alongside nonprofits in mid-tolong-term recovery from the pandemic. Qualifying nonprofits receive a line of credit or a grant to support critical and/or technical needs. Nonprofits selected receive a financial mentorship team to further strengthen their organization.



Our Building Healthy Communities Collaborative works to promote healthy lifestyles by providing produce pods to rural, food insecure communities in Colorado. In 2020, we worked with Flying Pig Farm in Manitou Springs to bring gardening home to students and families in the Manitou Springs School District. A twist on our normal program, the at-home gardening provided curriculum through an online platform to combat concerns from gathering on site at the Farm. Six student-led gardens were installed, planted, and harvested.


In 2020, The Garden Project of SW CO merged with Manna Soup Kitchen. The move was a strategic decision that strengthened The Manna Garden and its associated programs with the expansion of additional garden management and the seamless inclusion of the education-based, youth-focused garden programs that were core to The Garden Project's mission. Funding, which was delivered in two phases with a match component, covered costs and professional fees associated with closing The Garden Project, and provided personnel and programming support to Manna during and following the successful transition.

Lu Boren, an Agriculture Teacher with Escalante Middle School, has established an innovative program that inspires healthy food choices via a curriculum that teaches students how to grow, preserve, and cook locally grown produce. Funds helped to secure a new greenhouse skin to extend the growing season for the students and class supplies to provide the "farm to table" experience. We hope these resources will develop a strong program foundation that will pave the way for other funding sources and eventually, provide proof of concept for other schools in the district to adopt similar curriculums.



Through our relationship with Fort Lewis College, we learned that engineering students are underserved by the available tutoring on campus, and moreover. they are not getting the specific, specialized tutoring that they need. Moniker explored a student-led, engineering specific tutoring program during the 2020/2021 academic year. With a generous match from the Westmeath Foundation, we were able to fully fund the new program, which paid select upper-level students a reasonable wage to tutor students with the supervision of an attending professor. The program was wellreceived in its pilot year.



In partnership with Yampa Valley Autism Program (YVAP), students in the Community Cultivation Program planted, maintained, and cultivated food using produce pods. Produce was sold at the Steamboat Farmers Market where students practiced using life skills necessary for independence. All proceeds from the market benefited students in the program. An influx in outdoor recreation has created unforeseen strains on natural spaces, including an increase in trash, illegal campfires, and dog and human waste. To promote proper trail and wilderness etiquette, Friends of Wilderness (FOW) created the Wilderness Protection Promises campaign. In partnership with Routt County US Forest Service, FOW created posters to distribute at local trailheads, campsites, and businesses. To help combat food insecurity and prevent local restaurants from closing during COVID-19, Main Street Steamboat created the "Steamboat Loves Local" campaign. Gift cards were purchased at local restaurants and given to families and individuals in need. The grant provided a meal to 60 families and individuals in need in Routt County.


FAMILY GIVING PROGRAM

Family members gather to participate in a day of philanthropic service. Unfortunately, our family was unable to volunteer in 2020 due to the safety concerns with the pandemic. A \$5,000 grant was provided to Sustainable Settlings in Carbondale.



Youth, ages 6-10, practice the concepts of saving, growing, and giving money with a Moniker piggy bank. Moniker matches \$10 for every \$1 dollar saved. Six piggy banks were matched to support four nonprofits for a total of \$2,310. Through this program, we have also created a philanthropic children's book series that explores giving back.

EMERGENCY GRANT FUNDING

SCHOLAR RELIEF FUND \$10,500

An effort to support postsecondary student needs as they tackle unanticipated challenges related to the pandemic. Students received support for computers, rent, health care costs, and grocery cards. Funds were given to students enrolled in our three partnership programs.



EMERGENCY GRANTS \$42,000

Grants were given to organizations and community foundations in our three priority regions. Most recipients played a strong role in delivering basic human services to vulnerable communities.
